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Overview of Hebrews

WHAT IS IT? (GENRE)

Hebrews is a sermon-letter that weaves together biblical quotations, explanations, and exhortations.

Hebrews describes itself as a "word of exhortation" (13:22b); a phrase used to describe sermons in the first century (Acts 13:15). Hebrews also has been "written" (13:22c), bearing the marks of a letter (13:23-25).

WHO WROTE IT? (AUTHOR)

Hebrews does not record the author's name.

We can deduce that the author was associated with the apostolic crowd (13:23) but probably not an apostle themself (2:3).

WHO RECEIVED IT? (AUDIENCE)

Hebrews does not record the audience's name.

We can deduce that the audience had previously received the Christian message (2:1, 3) and has suffered for their faith (10:32-34). By the time of the letter being written, they were at risk of turning away from Christ (2:1, 3:12, 6:6, 10:35) and perhaps falling back into Old Covenant worship.

WHEN WAS IT WRITTEN? (DATING)

Hebrews does not record the writing date.

Study 10 — Hebrews 7:1-28

Hebrews 7:1-28 is a reasoned passage that unpacks how and why Jesus is the greater high priest. It begins by considering the strange encounter between the renowned father of God's people, Abraham and a strange priest-king called Melchizedek (*see Genesis 14:8-24). This story lays the foundation for comparing the priestly descendants of Abraham (those in the priestly tribe of Levi) with the Priest-King Jesus (in the kingly tribe of Judah and pattern of Melchizedek).

GETTING STARTED

What is your favourite adjective for Jesus?

READ 7:1-10

1. Describe who Melchizedek was. (v1-10 *see also Genesis 14:8-24; Psalm 110)

READ 7:11-28

2. Why couldn't Jesus be a Levitical priest? (v13-14)

3. How is he like Melchizedek instead? (v15-17)

It was first referred to outside the bible in Clement of Rome's letter to the Corinthian churches (c. 96 AD). Some have postulated that the letter may have been written before the temple was destroyed in 70 AD (10:2).

HOW DOES IT FIT TOGETHER? (STRUCTURE)

Hebrews shows the greatness of Jesus from many different angles! Below is a proposed structure:

1:1-4	Introduction
1:5-2:18	Jesus is greater than the angels
3:1-4:13	Jesus is greater than Moses and Joshua

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Study 1 — Hebrews 1:1-4

Study 2 — Hebrews 1:5–14

Hebrews 1:5-14 is an extraordinary passage weaving together seven Old Testament texts to make an incredible claim about Jesus. It compares God's great heavenly messengers, the angels, with the even greater king Jesus.

REFLECT

Some believe this passage is speaking about people among the Christian community, who can share in many of the blessings of Christ, without actually being saved themselves. Others believe this is a hypothetical warning to genuine Christians, used as a means to keep them from falling away. Either way, we are called to be 'taken forward into maturity' (6:1), trusting in the promises of God (6:13-20) and show that we are indeed fruit-bearing land (6:7).

• To what extent have you 'matured' in the past year / five years? What has helped you stick with Jesus?

• How can we help each other 'imitate those who through faith and patience inherit what has been promised' (6:12 *see also 11:1-40)?

Study 9 — Hebrews 5:11-6:20

Hebrews 5:11-6:20 is a tricky passage that presents a severe warning against giving up, confident that this is not where the Christian readers will end up.



Study 3 — Hebrews 2:1-4

Hebrews 2:1-4 is a sobering passage about how to live in light of the greatness of Jesus. The author contrasts the seriousness of salvation in Jesus with the Old Testament message spoken to Moses through the angels (*see Acts 7:38, 53; Galatians 3:19).

Study 8 — Hebrews 4:14-5:10

Hebrews 4:14-5:10 shifts to introduce the topic of priesthood, laying the foundation for the rest of the book of Hebrews. The passage reflects on the Old Testament priests (those in the tribe of Levi and descended from Aaron), showing once again how Jesus is greater.

GETTING STARTED

What images jump to mind when you hear the title 'priest'? Do Christians need one?

1. How would you summarise the job description of high priests? (5:1-4)

2. In what way was Christ appointed to be a high priest? (5:5-6, 10 *see also Psalm 2, 110)

Study 4 — Hebrews 2:5–18

Hebrews 2:5-18 is a grand passage that takes us through the story of humanity; created, fallen, redeemed and restored. As the author quotes from Psalm 8, he takes us from the failure of humanity to the greatness of Jesus, and finally, what that means for us.

GETTING STARTED

How successful are you at ruling the world? (Your garden? Your children? Your health? Your selfish thoughts?)

READ 2:5-18

- 1. What did God create humanity to be like? (v5-8a *quoting Psalm 8 and alluding to Genesis 1:26-28)
- 2. What is the problem the author sees? (v8d)
- 3. How does Jesus fulfil what it means to be human? (v9)
- 4. Each act of Jesus has a profound impact on humanity. Work your way through the rest of the chapter, noting what Jesus has done and what that means for humanity:

- 3. For us 'today':
 - a. What is the rest we are looking forward to?
 - b. How do we enter that rest?
- 4. What do we learn about God's Word from v12-13?

REFLECTION

- What changes between Moses and Joshua's day and ours, that gives us a greater hope?
- To what extent do Christians enjoy God's rest now? (v3, 9, 11 *see also 12:22-24; Matthew 11:28; Revelation 14:12-13)
- *Draw out the relationship between the garden of Eden, the promised land and heaven?
- *Is this passage in favour or not in favour of having a literal weekly 'Sabbath-rest'? (v6, 9, 10, 11 see also Colossians 2:16-17; Romans 14:1-6)

Study 7 — Hebrews 4:1-13

Hebrews 4:1-13 continues the warning of chapter 3, focusing on the rest that awaits God's wilderness people. It draws connections between the rest God established in creation, with the promised land Moses and then Joshua was to take God's people into and finally, with the eternal rest provided by Jesus.

GETTING THINKING

Study 5 — Hebrews 3:1-6

Hebrews 3:1-6 is a short, bitey passage that compares and contrasts the Old Testament figure Moses with Jesus Christ. Moses was the great leader who led God's people out of slavery in Egypt, gave them the law and brought them to the edge of the promised land. Yet, even this great figure cannot compare with the greatness of Jesus.

GETTING STARTED

What was the significance of Moses in the Old Testament?

Study 6 — Hebrews 3:7-19

Hebrews 3:7-19 carries forward the warning to God's people in the wilderness, repeated through successive generations and now spoken to us today. It takes us back to the generation of Moses in the wilderness (after they were rescued out of Egypt), to the generation of David (the great King who wrote Psalm 95), to our generation today as we hear God's Word. The passage warns wilderness people against 'starting well but ending badly'.

- 2. Consider the parallels the author is drawing between the generation 'in the wilderness' (*see Numbers 14) and those 'today'
